Kennedy Creek Salmon Trail opened in November of 2000 and each year is host to an average of 5,000 people. It provides a local "outdoor classroom" for teachers, students, and others interested in helping save Washington's salmon. Kennedy Creek is home to a healthy native chum salmon run. The operation of the low impact Trail will serve as a long-term educational resource; so please come check out the emerging chum fry and help us maintain the trail!

What we will be doing:

- Viewing the emerging chum fry within the creek
- Spreading gravel near the new viewing platform and along the pathway
- Fixing railings and adding a few more on our new viewing platform
- Spreading hog fuel on muddy areas on the pathway
- General trail maintenance such as raking leaves and picking up branches

What you'll need to bring:

- Boots
 - Rain gear/appropriate weather attire
 - A lunch and plenty of water
 - Something to sit on if you prefer
 - Gloves if you have them
 - Field guides or binoculars if you would like
- We will provide tools, supplies, water, light refreshments, and gloves.
Please dress appropriate for the weather.



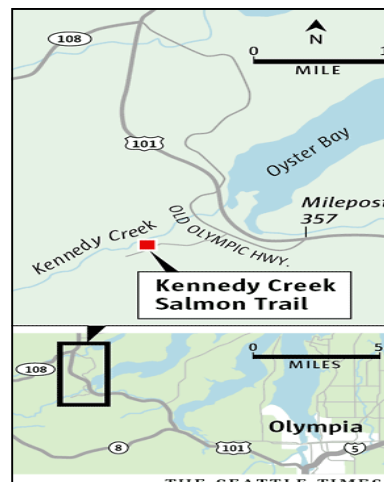

Directions to KCST:

The trail is located off Highway 101 between Olympia and Shelton. At mile-post marker 356 or 357, turn west onto Old Olympic Highway. Approximately 1 mile turn west again onto the gravel road signed Kennedy Creek Salmon Trail. Follow the gravel road approximately one half mile to the Trail parking lot. Please use caution while on this road as it is narrow, winding and used by logging trucks.
